



Seventy-one boys and girls across the state are having a merrier Christmas this year thanks to the Chatham County Sheriff's Office.

For more than 20 years CCSO employees and deputies have raised money, purchased gifts, wrapped and delivered them to the children who live in Georgia Sheriff's youth homes.

On December 4 more than a dozen folks from the CCSO and members of Explorer Post 876 traveled to Hahira, Ga. to the Boy's Ranch to hand deliver gifts to thirty children there.

The children range in age from four to 18. Some have been abused. Others have parents with substance abuse problems or are incarcerated.

This year the children asked for a wide range of gifts such as MP3 players, The North Face jackets, bicycles, baby dolls and even a case of Mountain Dew.

One teenage boy received a South Carolina Game Cocks blanket, a video game and a Polo hat. He said, "I got everything I wanted for Christmas!"

CCSO K-9 Unit Leading the Pack

When the CCSO K-9 Unit isn't busy keeping our community safe, they are teaching other agencies how to do the same.

In October the K-9 Unit was training nine other teams from across Georgia and South Carolina in explosives detection. They spent one morning at


the Georgia Air National Guard's 165th Airlift Wing learning to search for explosives hidden on and around the aircraft.

Later that day CCSO deputies and veterinarian Dr. Howes demonstrated first aid techniques to the out-of-town handlers. They learned how to take care of their four-legged partners if they are injured in the field.

The CCSO K-9 Unit is funded by two federal grants—the Homeland Security and Byrne grants. They have been a part of several Presidential details. Not only are they responsible for security sweeps at airports, golfing events and schools, but they are also required to train other agencies from across the southeast.

So far this year CCSO's six narcotic detecting K-9s performed more than 4,500 searches. The two explosive detecting K-9 teams conducted nearly 500 searches for explosives and firearms.
