

# **Sheriff Participates In Early Education Program**

FIGHT CRIME: INVEST IN KIDS is an anti-crime organization of more than 5,000 police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecutors and violence survivors nationwide, with over 30 members in the state of Georgia. Their mission is to take a hard-nosed look at the research about what really works to prevent kids from becoming criminals and to inform policymakers and the public about that research.

Invest in Kids takes a hard, but skeptical look at research on ways to keep kids successfully in school and out of the criminal justice system. They want to see young people in caps and gowns, not

handcuffs and jumpsuits. That's why they visit cities all over the country and urge Congress to find a way to implement the Administration's preschool and early learning proposal. It's one of the best things we can do, right now, to lower crime and the costs of locking people up in the years ahead.



Its important they know the impact the K-9's make on the whole department and just how appreciated they are.


Briston, a 10 year old Belgian Malinois will go home to live with his handler Lt Ralph Salas. His new partner Bullet is working out to be a "good dog too".

# Operation New Hope-Giving Abused Dogs TLC



Six very lucky, very happy dogs were dropped off at the Chatham County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday October 8th. Three of the dogs were rescued from one of the largest dog fighting rings ever broken up in the United States.

One of the dogs is deaf and the last two just need a good home and some training to make them

better candidates for adoption.

Operation New Hope is a program where low risk inmates spend 24/7 with the dogs in their care and train them in basic obedience. The dogs all became available for adoption in mid November.

# **CCSO Honor Guard**"Marching Strong"



"Orders being barked...directives being followed...the snap of the flag being folded over a loved one...the 'pop' of the National Color unfurled and waving in the breeze...boots hitting the ground in unison...the thunderous cacophony of a volley of M-14's being fired...

...a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery perhaps?

No, these are but the sounds of the Chatham County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard as they conduct those solemn ceremonies and practice at their 2nd "Bi-Annual" Training Assembly at the CCSO Range recently on October 15-16, 2013.

The CCSO Honor Guard, is under the command of Maj. Russell Smith, and under the direct operational control of Lt. Brett parker (R & D) and Sgt. L.D. Hollinger (StreetOps). This unlikely "Band of Brothers" was initially a hodge-podge of officers quickly thrown together, back in August of 1992, for the sole purpose of a one-time ceremony. However, now in its twenty second year as a professionally staffed operational Unit, this twenty officer strong force, as of this writing, has participated in no less than thirty three missions during calendar year 2013.

Not unlike the CCSO's Training Unit, the Honor Guard operates on a "Regional Mindset" as it has welcomed Instructor Training personnel from the Georgia State Patrol. It has also performed operations with the Savannah Chatham Metropolitan Police Department Honor Guard and invited both SCMPD and the recently formed Bloomingdale Police Department Honor Units to its training assembly.

Sheriff St Lawrence believes in the Work Release Program. The work release program is one of 12 inmate programs offered at the Chatham County Jail. It gives inmates a chance to pay court fees or back child support by actually going out and finding gainful employment . The

CCSO works hand in hand with Promise Land to monitor these inmates. They are all vetted before entering the program. It's a chance for them to get a fresh start while going through this tough period of their lives. Even though they are returning to the facility at night to serve their sentence they are able to go out during the day and start new lives. Promise Land also teaches the men how to do well in a job interview, write a resume and helps them with work apparel.


