



Day in the Life of the IT department proved to be yet another fascinating learning experience. Brian Anderson is the Network Administrator who manages the IT department to keep it moving forward in the right direction. The seven dedicated experts in the IT department are; George Enfinger, Michael Holmes, Billy Lappin, John Bayides, Rudy Gosyne, Gabriel Wright & Dana Mulvehill who work on computer issues, cyber security, audio/visual systems, security cameras, & SharePoint management just to name a few. Now, IT would like to share some helpful tips. Helpful Computer Tips, from the IT Department.

-The IT department will NEVER send a link in an email to reset your password.

- When having computer issues, use the in-house work order system thru Sharepoint. Stopping IT staff in the hallway is not a good way to ask for help as they often get side tracked & may forget your request later. Putting a work order into the system provides a written reminder. If you do not have the permissions to submit a work order ask your supervisor to do it for you.

-If your computer is doing something out of the ordinary, the first thing you should do is restart and see if the problem goes away. Doing this before submitting a work order will save everyone time.

-If you are receiving a lot of pop ups or other weird behavior and think your computer may have a virus the first thing you should do is unplug the network cable from your computer and then submit a work order or call the helpdesk at extension 7629.

I want to say, "thank you" to everyone in the IT department for taking time out of a very busy schedule, and also for providing useful Computer Tips for the Chatham County Sheriff's Office employees.




