
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ST PATRICK'S DAY IN SAVANNAH

his April will mark the two year anniversary of Operation New Hope. Almost everyone knows that Operation New Hope partners unadoptable dogs with inmates in the jail so that they can be obedience trained and become adoptable. Now I want to tell you what everyone does not know about Operation New Hope. Operation New Hope started in April 2012 with six dogs. Since that time 138 dogs have passed through our doors and that translates into 828 lives saved. Each dog that is housed in Operation New Hope is the equivalent of two lives being saved, because while one dog is being housed in the jail program, at least one more dog is being made available for adoption in the kennel the jail dog would have otherwise occupied.

Operation New Hope has had 94 graduates in the past two years. I would like to tell you about just one of those graduates. Inmate George Bailey entered the program in July 2012. He was in the program for three months and got out of Jail in October that same year. He had lost his job at Gulfstream and had almost lost his home. Inmate Bailey took the skills that Operation New Hope taught him to find a full-time job at the Humane Society for Greater Savannah. He has been there for almost a year and a half.

In the past two years, Operation New Hope has been featured in several different types of media. Operation New Hope was voted as one of Savannah's best dog programs by Savannah Magazine. Operation New Hope was featured in Well Feed Magazine for its service dog work.

Operation New Hope is a success because of the employees of the Chatham County Sheriff's Office. There is no way one person could have made Operation New Hope the success it is today; it has been a team effort all the way. I thank everyone who has shown an interest in the Operation New Hope. 








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K-9 assisting the U.S. Coast Guard



he Chatham County Sheriff's Office is much more than just a detention center. Over the next months I will feature each and every department within the Sheriff's Office. This edition my focus is on R&D and our K-9 Unit.

Unlike many K-9 Units ours is actually the only one of two units that can certify other agencies dogs and handlers in the state of Georgia. They hold a K-9 Medic class each year open to students from all over. They also have the only explosive sniffing dogs in the County.

Our K-9's along with their handlers are very proactive. School searches, gun searches, container searches and vehicle searches are just a few of the jobs they preform. In 2013 the CCSO K-9 Unit preformed 10,084 searches. The breakdown: 8813 narcotics searches, 998 explosive searches and 273 firearms searches. 48 total schools were searched for a total of 108 school searches. Plus over 700 thousand dollars worth of marijuana and illegal drugs were seized before they could get into the hands of drug dealers.



magine..... you have been arrested, you're transported to the CCDC, now what?? R&D (Receiving and Discharge) is one of the busiest places to work in the Chatham County Detention Center. On an average weekend R&D Deputies take in upwards of 200 people. Thats 200 mug shots, pat-downs, fingerprints, pre-booking forms, property forms, strip searches, "slides" and jump suits issued. If someone comes to jail with an injury they have to be seen by a nurse. If they come to jail with a combative attitude the process slows WAY down, and you could find yourself strapped in a special chair.

I worked a few hours in R&D so I could really speak to what goes on back there. Honestly, after four hours I can almost do one part of the process. I was amazed by the amount of work that goes on AFTER an officer drops someone off at the jail. When a person comes to jail its not a quick process, then on weekends like St Patrick's the unit can get very backed up.

My hats off to the very patient folks in R&D. If you have never been to jail (and lets hope it stays that way) I have included a few pictures of SOME of the things you're missing out on.

My favorite T.V. shows. –I like superhero and action movies, as far as television was hooked on Breaking Bad but now enjoy Almost Human and Marvel's Shield.





A NOTE FROM THE SHERIFF...



s most of you know, an external staffing audit was conducted on the Sheriff's Office operations for both Bureaus. The audit was very thorough, and the comments made by the audit team was predominately complementary of what you each do for this great agency.

The auditors did group interviews, and individual interviews with about 40 employees. In their executive summary they noted that many of the functions of both Bureaus were "performing well within the parameters of industry norms and best practices". They went on to say "Throughout this report we identify many of these areas and complement the Sheriff's Office for them".

One of the main areas they looked at was staffing of the jail. They noted that our facility was understaffed in 1993 when the new jail was opened. This problem has never been corrected. Hopefully, in the near future this can be corrected.

I appreciate all the work staff members contributed to getting through this in a professional manner.
