



CERT & MFF IN ACTION

• he Chatham County Sheriff's Office Corrections Emergency Response Team (CERT) and Mobile Field Force officers participated in training recently. They learned what they were doing right and ways to perform better in a multi-jurisdictional training exercise hosted by Metro Police Nov. 12. The exercise depicted a scenario of residents returning from an evacuation to unexpected issues. The lack of electrical power, food and water was amplified by protests, outside agitators, bomb threats and a jail riot.

Joining the CCSO CERT, was Metro Mobile Field Force, Canine and Traffic units, Georgia State Patrol, Alpharetta Police, Savannah-Hilton Head International Airport Police, 1st Battalion/75th Army Ranger Unit from Hunter Army Air Field, 16th Military Police Brigade from Fort Stewart, the antiterrorism unit from HAAF, FBI and Chatham Emergency Management Agency.

PROJECT LIFESAVER



roject Lifesaver, or commonly referred to as PLS, is an innovative and rapidly growing program aiding the victims and families suffering from Alzheimer Disease and related disorders such as Down's Syndrome and Autism. Project Lifesaver uses state-of-the-art technology employing wristband transmitters to locate wandering and lost adults and children. Over 5,000,000 people in the U.S.A. have Alzheimer. That number will triple by 2050. Well over 50% of these people wander and become lost. A lost person with Alzheimer's or other dementia represent a critical emergency as nearly half of them will die and many become injured or fall victim to predators if they are not located within 24 hours.

This program, highly favored by Sheriff Al St. Lawrence, was first adopted by the Chatham County Sheriff's Office in May 2009. Currently under the supervisory control of Lt. James Moore (Admin), internal coordination is conducted by Sgt. L.D. Hollinger (StreetOps), while training and recertification rests in the hands of Sgt. T. Glisson and Cpl. G. Murphy. Through the efforts of this small team of dedicated professionals, the PLS educational regimen and practical application has been able to raise the bar on the PLS program within the Enforcement Bureau. This training has been instrumental in our ability to assist those handicapped clientele and their immediate caregivers through careful monitoring and proactive planning.







EMERALD SOCIETY DELIVERS TOYS TO MEMORIAL

he Police Emerald Society of South East Georgia has been busy collecting toys for Santa's Workshop located in children's wing of Memorial Hospital. CCSO REVEALS DRUG FINDINGS

pproximately two hundred (200) pounds of suspected bulk marijuana was seized during several narcotics investigations conducted within the past six (6) months by the Chatham County Sheriff's Office. These narcotic investigations were worked jointly with the Chatham Savannah Counter Narcotics Team (CNT) and other federal agencies which have led to numerous arrests for possession and distribution of marijuana. The cases are still ongoing and arrestee's names are

not available at this time.

These seizures are a clear example of how federal and local agencies are coming together to address drug distribution in Chatham County. The seized marijuana has an approximate street value of over \$500,000

Marijuana use can have a variety of adverse, short- and long-term effects, especially on cardiopulmonary and mental health.

have been employed with the Chatham County Sheriff's Office for seven years. I have worked in various areas throughout the department and have enjoyed all of them.



We have added almost 500,000 thousand additional square feet of inmate living and support area functions to the Sheriff's Office Complex, renovated the older units heating and air, repurposed the prior medical area into inmate programs areas, upgraded the security door controls and added an additional 600 security cameras. We also opened the newly renovated staff dining area on the 19th of December and this has been a great success. This new break area offers a much larger seating capacity, skylights, larger outdoor break area, more varied vending machine selections and a full restaurant quality serving line. The 2nd phase project is being planned now and will include the renovation of unit five, replacement of the roof structure on the older areas of the complex, continued upgrades to the security systems and additional meeting space. We will keep you aware of this new project as it progresses.


