A deputy and a contract employee with the Chatham County Sheriff's Office were honored for their dedication to Chatham County's Drug Court.

September was National Alcohol and Drug Recovery Month and members of the Recovery Month Celebration committee presented CCSO Lt. Rick Hall with the annual William F. "Billy" Purvis Memorial Award.

Purvis was a sheriff's deputy for 15 years and served as the primary deputy for Chatham County Superior Court Judge James Bass and the Drug Court. Purvis held Drug Court participants to the letter of the law, but also showed them concern and compassion. Purvis died in 2008.

Court Services Move into New Digs at Courthouse

In March Court Services became operational in their new offices in the Judicial Courthouse basement as part of the Courthouse Renovation Project.

After years of planning and preparation, staff was able to move into a much larger space.

The renovations include an enclosed sally port and a state-of-the-art inmate transfer station. Inmates are moved safer and quicker from the holding stations to the court rooms. New cameras were installed and deputies can monitor activities outside and inside the courthouse, even in the courtrooms.
